House of Moses

Nursing care 24/7 for orphaned pre-mature and high risk infants



75 infants rescued in 2010
25 placed with extended family
16 adopted

Many more children can be reached in a single year because we are constantly working to move children out of our programs and into safe, nurturing families, making room for the next child in crisis.

House of Martha

Home for orphaned or abandoned children ages 4 to 14 who were at risk of becoming street children



78 boys and girls rescued in 2010

Food supplements for infants and young children

162 children can safely be cared for in their homes because of the food they receive. We work with the households receiving Milk and Medicine to bring them to stability and then to a place where they are self supporting.



Larger Home & Play Yard

Bill and Bette Bryant Crisis Nursery Gets a Larger Home and Play Yard!

Last year began with the toddlers in a small home that had very little play space. The house was down the street from a sewage recycling center and was prone to flooding and mosquitoes.



In October we moved the pre-schoolers from these crowded conditions into their new home with plenty of room to live, learn and play. With this move, all three of the rescue homes are within five minutes drive of each other, allowing us to make better use of resources, as well as giving the children a better place to heal and grow.

Expanded Social Work



We were able to add two social workers and one assistant in 2010. These new members of the team have increased our ability to counsel families and monitor children as they are integrated into extended families.

Many children and families received life-changing relief in 2010. These excellent programs are proven stable and effective.

Ngobeni for Adolescent Boys

Our goal is always to find families for the children who come into our homes. But sometimes, when the children are older, this is impossible. These youth must be guided into maturity and reintegrated into the community. We found an answer to this challenge in the traditional African village.



In Zambian villages two huts are set aside for youth, one for boys (an ngobeni) and another for girls (an ngobelo). While a young person is living in one of these huts they are taught to plan and prepare meals, work and study together and take responsibility for their own actions. In 2009 we opened a cottage—our first ngobelo for girls. Last year we were able to add a boy's Ngobeni. From these special youth homes the young people will move into the community, living with a Christian family and being sponsored by a local church.

Faith Works Church-Based Primary Schools

Partnering with local church congregations to provide a free Christ-centered primary education to orphans and needy children.

1,967 children attended Faith Works Schools in 2010

Edwin King Church of God offered grades 1 – 6 for 375 boys and girls. A daily lunch is provided and the church purchased a popcorn machine to use for income generation.

Free Baptist had grades 1 – 6 for 279 children who are also given a free lunch each school day. This school wins the “most improved” school for 2010. Though we are still operating with few resources, this church, serving the poorest of the poor continues to produce results.



Garden Presbyterian Church completed a new classroom and opened 5th grade, giving them grades 1 – 5 for 119 children. Until 2010, the pupils at this school had only a pit latrine and no running water. It was with great pleasure that a water tank has been put up and bathrooms with running water and toilets were completed.

Ngombe Presbyterian Church provided grades 1 – 7 for 378 pupils. During the year they were able to add a classroom block and pit latrines. One of

the volunteer teachers completed his night school teacher’s training course and is now a certified teacher. Pupils at this school receive one meal each week.

St. Stephen Agape Anglican Church provided grades 1 – 7 for 335 children. This school provides a free lunch each school day and gives milk to the children once each week. They have worked as a congregation to build their school into the flagship Faith Works School.

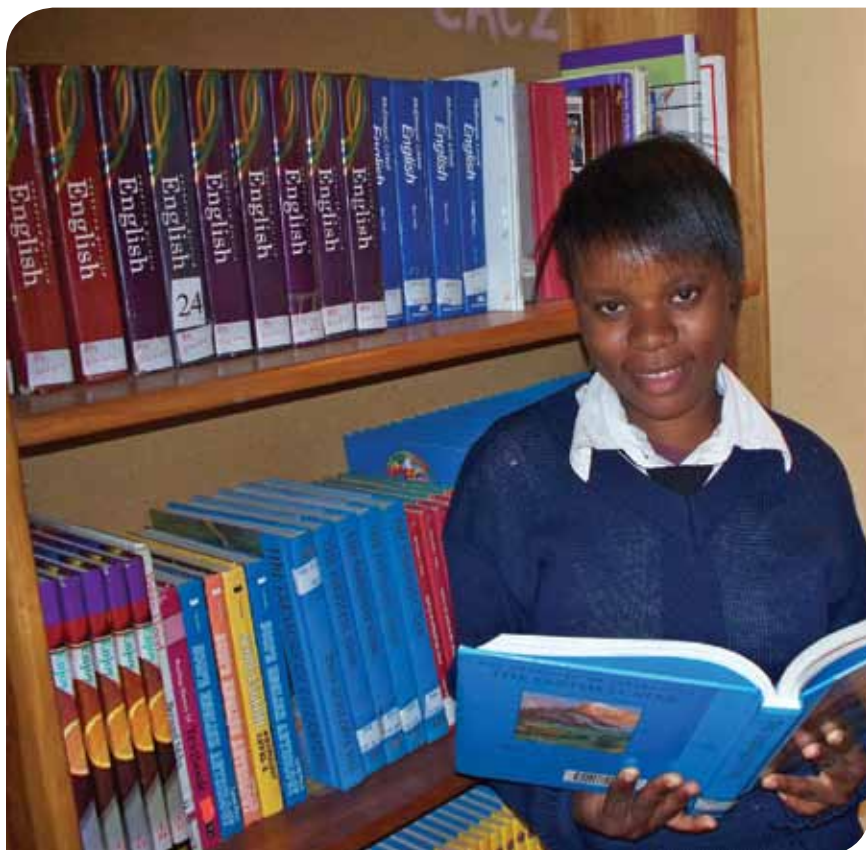
Tithandidze United Church of Zambia provided grades 1 – 7 to 268 students. Pupils at this school receive one meal each week.

True Gospel Community Church had grades 1 – 6 for 213. This innovative church has begun a partnership with another organization just down the road where they have additional classroom space.

186 students in the 7th grade at Faith Works schools averaged in the 95th percentile on the mandatory National Exam.

Helen DeVos Christian School

333 youth attended Helen DeVos Christian High School last year



In 2010, Helen DeVos Christian School added the 11th grade. Because of this school these youth are able to continue their education and will not be doomed to a life of menial labor in semi-literacy. HDCS provides students with a full 8 hours of classes and a free nutritious lunch each day.

Special needs education for children at House of Martha



In 2010, 78 boys and girls attended this special school during their time at House of Martha.

Vocational Skills Center Opened

In September, a wonderful skills training center was added where we are teaching carpentry, batik, knitting, carving and other skills that will prepare the children



for a productive life. The new Skill Center prepares youth at House of Martha to be self supporting, productive men and women.

The combination of academics with the vocational enables each child to develop his or her own potential.
